Course: RU101 - Elementary Russian I

1. Department

Languages and Humanities

2. Purpose

This introductory course is aimed to present Russian Language at elementary level. The focus of it is upon practical skills that could be applied within limited set of everyday life situations. The course includes classroom training in listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students will also learn the Cyrillic alphabet. By the end of the course students are also expected to be able to speak about some Russian cultural items.

Students will practice reading small texts, listening to fragments of announcements, adds, etc., writing short personal letters, notes, e-mail messages, and speaking about their families, studies, work, hobbies, art and culture. Students will also receive some instructions in basic grammar constructions. Class sessions will involve collaboration, team or individual work, and elements of discussion.
